

# Collaborative Sites

## Student Interaction and Knowledge Building with Drupal

The Collaborative Sites Platform allows for the rapid development of custom online learning environments focused on student interaction and knowledge building. These sites support multiple types of interaction, including group authorship and consensus building, class glossaries, knowledge repositories, course portfolios, student journals, and literary analysis.

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## Needs/Key Features:

The Collaborative Sites platform was created in response to increasing demand from instructors for an online environment to facilitate rich student-to-student interaction and collaboration. It provides a mix of blog-like and wiki-like interaction within the same organized frame. It is highly media friendly, with support for easy sharing and organization of images, audio, video. Collaborative Sites are generally used alongside the campus Course Management System, and provide a robust alternative to 3rd-party tools (e.g., blogger, pbwiki).

## Example Projects

### Communication

- **Communication Arts 262 (large lecture + discussion section):** Students analyze arguments and submit their own arguments for critique while sharing and organizing online resources. A variety of tasks provide students opportunities to share and discuss their work with small groups, their section, or with the entire class.

### Health Sciences

- **Communicative Disorders 706 (online seminar):** Students author team blogs on the management and assessment of voice disorders, and collaboratively assess challenging case studies.

### Languages

- **Italian 102 (multi-section language course):** FaceBook in Italian - students write short, personal updates, share Italian language YouTube videos, and leave comments.
- **Italian 203 (multi-section language course):** This project combined elements of blogging, photo-blogging, and social-networking software to facilitate communication between students in Italian outside of class time.

### Literature

- **East Asian Languages and Literature 371 (seminar):** "The Garden" is a collaborative online reading notebook, built around a central metaphor of the course text - a garden. Students built, cultivated, and maintained the interactive space while exploring classic Chinese literature.

### Social Sciences

- **History 205 (high enrollment online course):** Students discuss online lectures, photographs, video podcasts and other instructor posted media.
